### First Reading: Genesis 32:22-31

Returning to the home he had fled many years before after stealing his brother's birthright and his father's blessing, Jacob wrestles all night long with a divine adversary who ultimately blesses him and changes his name to "Israel," a name that means "he wrestles with God."

<sup>22</sup>The same night [Jacob] got up and took his two wives, his two maids, and his eleven children, and crossed the ford of the Jabbok. <sup>23</sup>He took them and sent them across the stream, and likewise everything that he had. <sup>24</sup>Jacob was left alone; and a man wrestled with him until daybreak. <sup>25</sup>When the man saw that he did not prevail against Jacob, he struck him on the hip socket; and Jacob's hip was put out of joint as he wrestled with him. <sup>26</sup>Then he said, "Let me go, for the day is breaking." But Jacob said, "I will not let you go, unless you bless me." <sup>27</sup>So he said to him, "What is your name?" And he said, "Jacob." <sup>28</sup>Then the man said, "You shall no longer be called Jacob, but Israel, for you have striven with God and with humans, and have prevailed." <sup>29</sup>Then Jacob asked him, "Please tell me your name." But he said, "Why is it that you ask my name?" And there he blessed him. <sup>30</sup>So Jacob called the place Peniel, saying, "For I have seen God face to face, and yet my life is preserved." <sup>31</sup>The sun rose upon him as he passed Penuel, limping because of his hip.

# Second Reading: 2 Timothy 3:14--4:5

The writer of this letter continues his instruction of Timothy, his younger colleague in ministry, by emphasizing the importance of faithful teaching despite opposition.

<sup>14</sup>But as for you, continue in what you have learned and firmly believed, knowing from whom you learned it, <sup>15</sup>and how from childhood you have known the sacred writings that are able to instruct you for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. <sup>16</sup>All scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, <sup>17</sup>so that everyone who belongs to God may be proficient, equipped for every good work.

<sup>4:1</sup>In the presence of God and of Christ Jesus, who is to judge the living and the dead, and in view of his appearing and his kingdom, I solemnly urge you: <sup>2</sup>proclaim the message; be persistent whether the time is favorable or unfavorable; convince, rebuke, and encourage, with the utmost patience in teaching. <sup>3</sup>For the time is coming when people will not put up with sound doctrine, but having itching ears, they will accumulate for themselves teachers to suit their own desires, <sup>4</sup>and will turn away from listening to the truth and wander away to myths. <sup>5</sup>As for you, always be sober, endure suffering, do the work of an evangelist, carry out your ministry fully.

## Gospel Reading: Luke 18:1-8

Jesus tells a parable of an unjust judge who is worn down by a widow's pleas. Jesus is calling God's people to cry out for justice and deliverance. For if an unethical judge will ultimately grant the plea of a persistent widow, how much more will God respond to those who call.

<sup>1</sup>Then Jesus told them a parable about their need to pray always and not to lose heart. <sup>2</sup>He said, "In a certain city there was a judge who neither feared God nor had respect for people. <sup>3</sup>In that city there was a widow who kept coming to him and saying, 'Grant me justice against my opponent.' <sup>4</sup>For a while he refused; but later he said to himself, 'Though I have no fear of God and no respect for anyone, <sup>5</sup>yet because this widow keeps bothering me, I will grant her justice, so that she may not wear me out by continually coming.' " <sup>6</sup>And the Lord said, "Listen to what the unjust judge says. <sup>7</sup>And will not God grant justice to his chosen ones who cry to him day and night? Will he delay long in helping them? <sup>8</sup>I tell you, he will quickly grant justice to them. And yet, when the Son of Man comes, will he find faith on earth?"

### <u>The Sermon: Don't Lose Heart (preached by Father Brian Wearne at Trinity on October</u> <u>16, 2022)</u>

In the name of the true and living God: 🕂 Father, Son and Holy Spirit. Amen.

Before Jesus began the journey from Galilee to Jerusalem and His Cross, Jesus warned His Apostles that He would be rejected, killed, and raised on the 3<sup>rd</sup> day (Luke 9:22,44). As we hear Him tell The Parable of The Tenacious Widow, Jesus has just been speaking of His 2<sup>nd</sup> Coming (Luke 17:20-37). Through much of Pentecost, we have heard many great teachings Jesus gave along the road, and clearly, the Parable Jesus tells to-day deals with persistence in prayer. But mere continual prayer is not what Jesus is teaching us today. Today, Jesus is teaching us that between His 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Comings, God won't abandon us if we remain faithful to Him and people of steadfast prayer until Jesus Returns. Consequently, Christ's Parable of The Tenacious Widow isn't intended to apply to prayer in general, as though we have to bother God for every need until He reluctantly responds to us. No, this parable is about our vindication by God when the world misunderstands us and we suffer for it. In the Old Testament Age, God's People needed to "wait" on God as He worked out justice with apparent slowness.

God's People began to wonder if His promised Saviour would ever come. As King David wrote: "O my God, I trust in You; let me not be ashamed; let not my enemies triumph over me. Indeed, let no one who waits on You be ashamed; let those be ashamed who deal treacherously without cause" (Psalm 25:2-3).

Today, many feel like God's People felt before Christ's 1<sup>st</sup> Coming. Will Jesus really Return? Along with the martyrs who died for their faith in Christ, we await our vindication by God as He works out justice with apparent slowness, and in a glimpse of heaven we hear from St. John the Evangelist: "When Christ opened the 5<sup>th</sup> seal, I saw under the altar the souls of those who had been slain for the word of God and for the testimony which they held. And they cried with a loud voice, saying, 'How long, O Lord, holy and true, until You judge and avenge our blood on those who dwell on the earth?' Then a white robe was given to each of them; and it was said to them that they should rest a little while longer, until both the number of their fellow servants and their brethren, who would be killed as they were, was completed" (Revelation 6:9-11). As we, The Church, wait along with the martyrs for Christ's Return and judgement of the living and the dead, we struggle with the continual presence of evil in the world. How can an omnipotent, good and loving God allow injustice to occur?

These end times we live in between Christ's 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> Comings are just as Jesus described them when He said: "As it was in the days of Noah, so it shall be also in the days of the Son of Man: They ate, they drank, they married wives, they were given in marriage, until the day that Noah entered the ark, and the flood came and destroyed them all. So it shall be when the Son of Man is revealed" (Luke 17:26-27,30).

Jesus is warning us to be prepared for His Return here - He is warning us to beware lest our daily concerns replace an active, personal waiting for His Return. Jesus is warning us that those whom He finds faithless, those who reject a relationship with Him and do not pray to Him will be destroyed, as so many were in the days of Noah! But Jesus is also encouraging us, isn't He? Jesus is saying that we live in a similar time "as it was in the days of Noah". God didn't abandon Noah. God won't abandon us. So we must remain faithful to God, a people of steadfast prayer, because prayer is a vital step in preparation for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Coming of Jesus. So as He begins His Parable of The Tenacious Widow, Jesus teaches us we always ought to pray and not lose heart. And as we shall see, our faith in Jesus will serve as the engine for our prayer. The Tenacious Widow is a woman who lived in a patriarchal society. With no male representation, she's the very image of powerlessness and poverty (Luke 7:11-17; 20:45-21:4).

The Unjust Judge who didn't fear God or respect people resembles a steward we recently heard about, (Luke 16:1-13), and we should probably see him as "a man of the world", who prided himself on his shrewd judicial decisions. Being easily accessible, and having the authority to make quick decisions, he would naturally be besieged by people such as this widow. But this widow was tenacious, relentless, persistent. Have you ever dealt with a woman like her? The heathen judge said within himself that "yet because this widow troubles me I will avenge her, lest by her continual coming she weary me". As he says this, the Greek for the words "weary me", are literally "to give a black eye to", probably referring to the common idiom in Eastern countries, where to have one's face blackened means to suffer shame. So the unjust judge is well aware that this persistent widow who's seeking "justice from her adversary" has put his reputation at stake. And being a man of the world, his reputation is highly important to him.

Jesus makes it clear that we - The Church - are represented by the widow in His parable. As Jesus calls us 'the elect' or 'Chosen ones', He's reassuring us that at His Return, we'll be on the winning side like Noah and his family. Of His elect, Jesus also said that "He will send His angels with a great sound of a trumpet, and they will gather together His elect from the four winds, from one end of heaven to the other" (Matthew 24:31).

Who is God in this parable? On the one hand, the heathen judge is a man of the world who "does not fear God or regard people". This unjust judge doesn't pray to God. So this judge represents those people destroyed at Christ's 2<sup>nd</sup> Coming, like those "in the days of Noah". On the other hand, there's a partial basis of comparison between God and this judge, insofar as God will also guard His reputation, execute justice, and vindicate both Himself and us when Jesus Returns to judge both the living and the dead.

We can draw 2 lessons from this parable. If the persistent pleading of the helpless widow triumphs over an unjust judge, how much more will the persistent prayers of Christians achieve? And if an unjust judge yields to the entreaties of a powerless, poor widow, how much more will a loving merciful God? Although we share this world with people who don't believe in God, and though we bump up against the very presence of evil, the decisive question here isn't about God's justice and vindication of us. God will certainly vindicate us when Jesus Returns! But the decisive question is if we will remain faithful to Jesus until He *finally* Returns. God is patiently listening to our prayers, as He waits for the proper time to act on our behalf. Help is on the way, and the delay will prove shorter than it seems from our human perspective. Meanwhile, we are to persistently wait for Christ's Return with patient trust, and pray continually so that we do not lose heart.

Today we hear Jesus promise us He will avenge any injustices committed against us. In fact, Jesus promises that He will vindicate us "speedily". But we also heard Jesus pose a question to us: "When I return, will I **really** find faith on the earth?" "When I return, will I **reall**y find faith on the earth?" Folks, each of us must take great care to remain faithful, so that when Jesus **does** Return, the dead are resurrected, and all of us are Judged by Him, Jesus **will** find faith on the Earth! Jesus will find that faith present in us.

In the meantime, we recall why Jesus urges us that we always ought to pray to Him. As long as we talk with our Lord Jesus Christ in prayer — we will continue in our relationship with God. As long as we pray, we will continue to trust Christ's promise that He will Return for us, and gather us into His Kingdom. This is the promise Jesus reminds us of today. So pray persistently to Jesus every day. Pray with confidence to Jesus every day.

And Don't Lose Heart.

Don't *Ever* Lose Heart.

And now to  $\oplus$  God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit, be all might, majesty, dominion and honour, this day and forevermore. Amen.
