O God, rich in mercy,



First Reading: Numbers 21: 4-9

⁴From Mount Hor [the Israelites] set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of Edom; but the people became impatient on the way. ⁵The people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we detest this miserable food."

⁶Then the Lord sent poisonous serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many Israelites died. ⁷The people came to Moses and said, "We have sinned by speaking against the Lord and against you; pray to the Lord to take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. ⁸And the Lord said to Moses, "Make a poisonous serpent, and set it on a pole; and everyone who is bitten shall look at it and live." ⁹So Moses made a serpent of bronze, and put it upon a pole; and whenever a serpent bit someone, that person would look at the serpent of bronze and live.



Second reading: Ephesians 2:1-10

¹You were dead through the trespasses and sins ²in which you once lived, following the course of this world, following the ruler of the power of the air, the spirit that is now at work among those who are disobedient. ³All of us once lived among them in the passions of our flesh, following the desires of flesh and senses, and we were by nature children of wrath, like everyone else. ⁴But God, who is rich in mercy, out of the great love with which he loved us ⁵even when we were dead through our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ-by grace you have been saved—⁶and raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, ⁷so that in the

ages to come he might show the immeasurable riches of his grace in kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. ⁸For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God—⁹not the result of works, so that no one may boast. ¹⁰For we are what he has made us, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life.



Gospel: John 3: 14-21

[Jesus said:] ¹⁴"Just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the wilderness, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, ¹⁵that whoever believes in him may have eternal life. ¹⁶"For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him may not perish but may have eternal life.

¹⁷"Indeed. God did not send the Son into the world to condemn the world, but in order that the world might be saved through him. ¹⁸Those who believe in him are not condemned; but those who do not believe are condemned already, because they have not believed in the name of the only Son of God. ¹⁹And this is the judgment, that the light has come into the world, and people loved darkness rather than light because their deeds were evil. ²⁰For all who do evil hate the light and do not come to the light, so that their deeds may not be exposed. ²¹But those who do what is true come to the light, so that it may be clearly seen that their deeds have been done in God."

Sermon

Light of grace

God's grace and peace be with you this day and throughout your journey...

I'd like to share a story about a church in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

The church is in the city's downtown. It has a fifteen-storey tower that illuminates the evening sky as it has for more than seventy years. There was a time when the tower was only lit two nights each week because money was tight at the church.

On one of those nights, the pastor was working in his office when a woman appeared at the door. She wore a fur coat to protect her from the chill of the winter air ... her wind-blown bleached hair framed her despondent face.

The woman had arrived in the city earlier in the day planning to commit suicide.

She had rented a room at a local hotel and ... as she was closing the curtains ... she saw the lights of the tower. The woman told the pastor that she stood at the window ... feeling called to the source of the lights.

The pastor asked the woman to sit down and the two talked for the next couple of hours ... the woman did most of the talking ... the pastor just listened and gently asked questions about her reasons for wanting to commit suicide.

He then asked her if she would be willing to read two books. ... the books spoke of a meaningful life. The woman eventually agreed.

The pastor handed her one book ... but as he searched his book shelves he realized that the other was at the parsonage.

He asked the woman if she would be willing to go with him as he retrieved the book. After some hesitation, she agreed.

At the parsonage, the woman refused to come inside while he grabbed the book.

As she waited in the car, the pastor's wife came out and got in the backseat. A moment later ... the pastor returned ... got behind the steering wheel ... and handed the woman the second book.

The couple took the woman back to her hotel ... dropping off her and the two books at the lobby door.

The following week, one of the books arrived in the mail. The pastor and his wife were relieved that the woman hadn't committed suicide. A few weeks later, the second book arrived.

The following Christmas, the pastor received a special delivery letter from the woman.

In the letter, she wrote that the reception she received when she arrived at the church office helped her survive a terrible bout of depression.

In fact, she not only survived, but she had entered a training program to become a medical missionary so she could serve and help heal others ... all of this ... she wrote ... was the result of the lights she saw from her hotel room.

For her, those lights were beacons of hope and love.

At the next meeting of the church stewards, the pastor asked for the church budget to include a provision that allowed the tower lights to be on every night of the year.

And the lights have shone ever since.

The church tower ... like church steeples ... evolved from watch towers.

These towers would allow sentries to see danger coming and would be key points to defending against an attack.

At night ... when a light was raised on the tower ... it would serve as a beacon for travelers or others looking for sanctuary ... a safe place in the darkness. It signalled a place to be avoided by the things that lurked in the darkness.

The ideas of light and darkness are central to today's passage from John and in Paul's letter.

Leading into today's passage from John, Nicodemus ... a Pharisee and one of the leaders of the Jews ... had come to Jesus to meet this teacher he had heard so much about.

He arrived under cover of darkness.

After all, it wouldn't do his reputation with the Pharisees and the scribes at the temple any good if it became known that he was seen conversing with Jesus.

Still, he had questions for the rabbi ... questions that only someone sent by God could answer ... even if he has to ask them in secret.

During the course of the conversation, Jesus tells Nicodemus who will be able to see the Kingdom of God.

Jesus tells him that a person needs to be born of the water and the spirit in order to enter the kingdom of God. But Nicodemus still isn't connecting the dots.

Nicodemus finally asks, "How can these things be?"

Today's passage is Jesus' answer to that question. How can these things be? ... well this is how.

In his explanation to Nicodemus, Jesus talks about living in the light and how those living in the dark hate the light.

Jesus tells Nicodemus an essential truth ... *the* essential truth ... that God so loved the world, that he gave his only Son so that the world can be saved.

Jesus tells him that this light that is coming into the world ... is to be raised like the pole Moses raised ... beckoning people ... healing people ... allowing them to see the things in the dark for what they are ... things that break or prevent loving, respectful relationships.

The passions of the flesh.

John's gospel tells us what the cross holds for us ... Paul's letter this morning tells us what we hold for the world ... the light of grace that we have received through the cross.

This light allows each of us to fully judge the things we do ... and don't do ... to truly assess what we hold close to our hearts ... what we should push away or oppose with all our being.

Such personal and spiritual reflection are at the heart of the Lenten Season.

Biblical scholar Anna Bowden once wrote that during our Lenten journey to the cross ... we are immersed in deep reflection ... our heads down in contemplation of where we have fallen short ... where there are wrongs in the world. That during the journey, it can be easy to lose sight of its conclusion. Today's passages give us cause to look up from the path.

Today is Laetare Sunday. It is traditionally a day of celebration during this season of sacrifice and scarcity.

By the way, in Latin, the word "laetare" means: "rejoice!"

... rejoice!

The lessons from John and Paul remind us that we have cause to rejoice at the midpoint of the Lenten sojourn ... it is a moment of light within the darkness of the season.

We are invited to poke our heads up and look toward the cross ... to remind ourselves of what lies at the end of the journey ... to remind ourselves why we make such a journey.

John's gospel ... and Paul's letter ... makes it clear that the journey does not end at the foot of the cross.

Jesus' journey to Jerusalem continues to a tomb ... and to his ascension ... when he is raised up ... like the pole Moses raised before the Israelites.

It is when Jesus truly became a light ... a beacon of love and hope for the world. Jesus' presence in the world illuminates the truth and it also illuminates the sins ... the acts and the thoughts that separate us from that truth.

It is a light that marks the place love holds firm in the world. It is the light of grace ... of hope. Paul tells the Ephesians that it is our call ... our responsibility ... to carry that light out into the world ... not because it gains us anything ... not because we gain favour or an added measure of grace ... but because God so loved the world ... all of it ... from soil and water ... to animal and person ... and so should we.

Grace compels us into the world ... grace compels us to serve and minister out of love. As Paul wrote, through faith we have grace and the Spirit works within us.

Grace and faith shape our mission to the world just as it should our lives.

Perhaps, during our Lenten reflections, we can adapt Nicodemus' question for our own life.

But instead of "How can these things be?" perhaps we can ask "How can I better love the world?"

Grace calls us to stand with others whose voice has been ignored or silenced ... to heal the wounds inflicted by the world ... and to bring the new life that came through the cross out into the world.

When we love as God loves ... unconditionally ..., we become beacons of grace ... we become a light that calls others into the safety of community ... calling others out of the darkness just like the light in downtown Tulsa did for the desperate woman who considered ending it all. To do what is true to this light ... without pretense or ego ... to simply love ... is where the Spirit calls us.
