First reading: Zephaniah 3:14-20

Sing aloud, O daughter Zion;
 shout, O Israel!
 Rejoice and exult with all your heart,
 O daughter Jerusalem!

¹⁵ The Lord has taken away the judgments against you,

he has turned away your enemies. The king of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst;

you shall fear disaster no more.

¹⁶ On that day it shall be said to Jerusalem:

Do not fear, O Zion;
do not let your hands grow weak.

¹⁷ The Lord, your God, is in your midst, a warrior who gives victory;

he will rejoice over you with gladness, he will renew you in his love;

Second reading: Philippians 4: 4-7

⁴ Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. ⁵ Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. ⁶ Do not worry about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. ⁷ And the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.



Gospel: Luke 3:7-18

⁷ John said to the crowds that came out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? ⁸ Bear fruits worthy of repentance. Do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our ancestor'; for I tell you, God is able from

these stones to raise up children to Abraham. ⁹ Even now the ax is lying at the root of the trees; every tree therefore that does not bear good fruit is cut down and thrown into the fire."

¹⁰ And the crowds asked him, "What then should we do?" ¹¹ In reply he said to them, "Whoever has two coats must share with anyone who has none; and whoever has food must do likewise." ¹² Even tax collectors came to be baptized, and they asked him, "Teacher, what should we do?" ¹³ He said to them, "Collect no more than the amount prescribed for you." ¹⁴ Soldiers also asked him, "And we, what should we do?" He said to them, "Do not extort money from anyone by threats or false accusation, and be satisfied with your wages."

¹⁵ As the people were filled with expectation, and all were questioning in their hearts concerning John, whether he might be the Messiah, ¹⁶ John answered all of them by saying, "I baptize you with water; but one who is more powerful than I is coming; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandals. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹⁷ His winnowing fork is in his hand, to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his granary; but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

¹⁸ So, with many other exhortations, he proclaimed the good news to the people.

Sermon

Feel the joy!

May you feel the joy of God's grace in your hearts and in your lives this morning and always ...

Since we entered the Advent season, we have been in a period of expectation ... anticipating God breaking into the life of the world in the form of a baby in a manger. It is a time when we journey through the darkness of the season ... preparing ourselves ... clearing away the barriers to fully receiving and fully giving love.

But let's put all that on pause this morning.

The third Sunday in Advent is known as Rose Sunday or for the more traditionalist among us ... as Gaudete <gaw -dee -tee> Sunday. It is also called the Sunday of Joy.

In some faith traditions, the Advent wreath candle that would be lit this morning would be pink or rose-coloured rather than the usual blue.

This day focuses on the response to the promise and nearness of God. And that response should be joy ... joy and gladness in the promised redemption ... the promise of a new creation.

John doesn't seem too joyous this morning as he calls the crowd on the banks of the Jordan a "brood of vipers!"

The people's self-interest in offering to repentance threatens to poison their relationships.

Last week, Luke offered us the image of John the Baptist as the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophesy.

Isaiah's call to prepare the way of the Lord ... by filling in valleys ... by levelling hills and mountains ... by straightening the paths that lead to God ... is seen as preparing one's heart and the life of the world for the coming Messiah.

In the wilderness, John proclaims a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. It is a message that touches something within the people. Crowds flock to hear John and to be baptized in the Jordan.

Today ... in the wilderness ... John tells the gathering what true repentance means for them and for the world ... what they will experience once the way is prepared.

Repentance through baptism is not about simply washing sins away ... to John ... repentance carries far greater value and responsibilities that extend beyond the individual.

Those are the vipers that he addresses at the beginning of this morning's passage ... the people who look at repentance solely as personal salvation when the Son of Man returns.

John tries to head off such thoughts.

He expects some in the crowd to claim privilege through their lineage ... that their ties to Abraham ... excludes them from having to bear good fruit from their repentance. These people ... like some in modern congregations ... believe the works of their ancestors ... their legacy ... grants them special

status when it comes to acting within a community. Some even argue that what they themselves did in the past gives them special status and privilege.

Nonsense, John would say to such a notion.

John warns those who believe their lineage means they do not have to produce good fruit ... he says such unproductive family trees deserve to be tossed into the fire.

Members of the crowd ask John, "What, then, should we do?"

In essence, they want to know how to live into their baptism.

The people who asked this question weren't the ones who count Abraham as an ancestor. The people who want to know how they can live into the forgiveness they have received through repentance are those who society despises or who it has pushed to the margins by circumstances.

They are told to express generosity and empathy for the poor and the hungry ... feeding and clothing them rather than hording necessary items for themselves.

The tax collectors are told not to extort extra money from those paying taxes ... the soldiers are told not to bully or oppress others. They are told how to amend their practices to live into the full promise of repentance.

It is a promise that reshapes the world.

To Luke, repentance is lived out in one's everyday practices.

Willie James Jennings is a professor of theology at Yale University.

About this morning's passage, he wrote:

"The life of repentance reverses the order of possibility. When it comes to our life and work, the life of repentance demands that we ask what <u>can</u> be done, "

John's answers to the gathering shows what can be done ... what forms generosity, justice and contentment mark lives that bear the good fruits of repentance.

Repentance to John ... and to Luke ... is an invitation ... it is an invitation to a life that is aligned with God's purpose. It is a life of joy ... and that is the good news within this story.

There is joy in sharing ... there is joy in being welcomed and embraced by a community. The sorrow of hunger and of a life alone is replaced by the joy of nourishment and relationship.

John challenges the people ... and us, as well ... to consider our relationships with God and with one another. John calls us to live into our baptismal promise ... the promise God made to to us ... and our promise to God and to one another to live life differently ... to live humbly and lovingly ... to model what can be.

Gaudete Sunday is anchored in Paul's letter to the Philippians. It is a passage that calls on the people to rejoice and give thanks because God has come near and freedom is known. It is a freedom that comes through baptism and through a heart cleansed of sorrow and fear ... all the bad fruits.

As Paul writes to the Philippians, baptism is a welcome into new identity that lifts people out of worry and aggression and into "the peace of God, which passes all understanding." (4:7; Melinda Quivik)

It is a joyous peace.

Advent ... as the darkness begins to ease as we near the manger ... remains a time when we are called into self-reflection ... a time when we make paths straight and remove the obstacles to faith-filled love.

It is a time to consider if we are in right relationships or if our relationships are marked by assumed privilege rooted in lineage and tradition. A time to consider whether or not we have fully lived into the baptismal promise ... whether we produced good fruits or have allowed things to wither on the vine.

It is a time to consider what can be done.

In baptism, we are called to imitate John the Baptist and point to Jesus.

The voices of John the Baptist and of Paul tell us how to prepare for this arrival: share your stuff, stop worrying, live with justice and sing with joy. (Liv Larson Andrews)

Is this how we respond to the advent of the Lord?

John ... this morning ... gives a picture of action-oriented fruits of repentance ... of grace active in the world ... of the loving relationship that

should mark the lives of those who follow the one who comes after John.

Repentance then is not just about sin, it is about life and how we share life-giving and life-affirming grace.

It is how we allow the Spirit to work in and through us ... how the Spirit burns away the life-diminishing parts of our lives ... leaving behind the affirming relationships and that are marked by acts that bear witness to the love we have received and share.

It is when we know what can be done.

Through such love ... joy flourishes. And it is such joy that is experienced as God breaks into the world in the form of a baby.

Let us be joyous and let us share that joy!
