First reading Jeremiah 31:7-14

⁷Thus says the Lord: Sing aloud with gladness for Jacob, and raise shouts for the chief of the nations;

proclaim, give praise, and say, "Save, O Lord, your people, the remnant of Israel."

Second reading: Ephesians 1:3-14

³Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, 4 just as he chose us in Christ before the foundation of the world to be holy and blameless before him in love. 5 He destined us for adoption as his children through Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of his will, 6 to the praise of his glorious grace that he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved. ⁷ In him we have redemption through his blood, the forgiveness of our trespasses, according to the riches of his grace 8 that he lavished on us. With all wisdom and insight 9 he has made known to us the mystery of his will, according to his good pleasure that he set forth in Christ, ¹⁰ as a plan for the fullness of time, to gather up all things in him, things in heaven and things on earth. 11 In Christ we have also obtained an inheritance, having



been destined according to the purpose of him who accomplishes all things according to his counsel and will, ¹² so that we, who were the first to set our hope on Christ, might live for the praise of his glory. ¹³ In him you also, when you had heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and had believed in him, were marked with the seal of the promised Holy Spirit; ¹⁴ this is the pledge of our inheritance toward redemption as God's own people, to the praise of his glory.

Gospel: John 1:1--18

¹ In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things came into being through him, and without him not one thing came into being. What has come into being ⁴ in him was life, and the life was the light of all people. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.

⁶ There was a man sent from God,

whose name was John. ⁷ He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸ He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ⁹ The true light, which enlightens everyone, was coming into the world.

¹⁰ He was in the world, and the world came into being through him; yet the world did not know him. ¹¹ He came to what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. ¹² But to all who received him, who believed in his name, he gave power to become children of God, ¹³ who were born, not of blood or of the will of the flesh or of the will of man, but of God.

¹⁴ And the Word became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. ¹⁵ (John testified to him and cried out, "This was he of whom I said, 'He who comes after me ranks ahead of me because he was before me.' ") ¹⁶ From his fullness we have all received, grace upon grace. ¹⁷ The law indeed was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. ¹⁸ No one has ever seen God. It is God the only Son, who is close to the Father's heart, who has made him known.

Sermon

Reflecting light

May God's grace be felt in your lives and the lives you touch

Last summer, a group of forestry researchers discovered ... quite by accident ... a super-black material that they call "nyxlon." (niks-uh-lon)

The researchers in British Columbia were trying to develop a way of making wood more water-repellant. They used high-energy plasma to etch a lotus-leaf design onto the surfaces of pieces of wood. The designs ... they hoped ... would slough off water the way a lotus leaf does in the wild. It could reduce the need for chemical treatments to the wood.

But when the researchers applied the plasma to the cut ends of the wood pieces, the ends turned black ... very black ... super-black.

The researchers discovered that this new material absorbs more than 99 per cent of the light that hits it.

This was big news in science circles because absorbing more light makes telescopes and solar panels more precise and efficient.

Right now, coats of black paint or veneer are used when it's important to capture light and ... in the best cases ... only 97-and-a-half per cent of the light is trapped.

That extra percent and a half superblack captures is huge.

This morning, we hear from the Gospel of John ... we head over to Luke next week ... in the church calendar, it's the year of Luke, after all.

Overall, John's gospel is about three things ... the people's origins ... their relationships ... and their identity.

These areas were important to the people who first heard John's gospel message.

The temple had been destroyed ... the Roman rulers had scattered the Jewish population across the region. The people were disconnected from the centre of their faith and from one another. John's audience needed hope and guidance as they navigated into the future.

This morning, John's gospel offers an invitation to view the world differently ... for people to reorient themselves to a different relationship with God and with one another.

John carries us to the very beginning of creation ... "in the beginning was the Word. The Word was with God and the Word was God."

Since the beginning ... the gospel author reminds listeners ... all things are tied to God and God remains part of the life of the world. The Word became human to experience and fully understand the struggles ... the challenges ... and even the joys ... of being human.

God puts skin on light, grace and truth in the form of Jesus so that followers ... the children of God ... can know how light, grace and truth sound and act so the people have an example to follow.

John presents an image of a more intimate God ... one who is among us ... who brings us comfort ... healing ... and love ... who became flesh in order to draw near to us.

Lutheran theologian Craig Koester once spoke about this morning's passage from John.

During a podcast, Koester said:

"You get the power of God, the presence of God revealed even in the human touch that Jesus has in his healing ... in the human words he speaks, but also in the human death he experiences.

"The power of the divine love being revealed in a human form is ultimately what gives life."

... love then gives us life.

... love that brings light to darkness of the world.

We are in a time of transition ... from Advent to Christmas toward Epiphany ... as individuals we move from the unknown to the known as Jesus' nature is revealed to us in the coming weeks ... as a community of faith we are moving from the security of the known to the uncertainty of the unknown.

Through it all we can find certainty in God's love for creation ... in God's unconditional love for each of us.

In John, that love takes the form of light ... a light that pushes back against the darkness of the world. It is a light that makes all the world's injustices and all its wounds visible so that they can be confronted and healed.

It is this light that illuminates humanity's true nature, which we are called to live into and to embrace the joy that comes through divine love.

It is a love that comes in the form of grace ... of grace upon grace. It is a

grace that comes through belief in Jesus ... a belief that makes us children of God ... bearers of the truth that lights our way ... inheritors of a love that shines on and through us. It is a love we are most certainly called to practice ... to share ... to make known.

Let's circle back to the super-black ... light-absorbing material ... for a moment.

It takes almost all the light it receives ... and holds it within itself. It keeps its surroundings in darkness ... ensuring that nothing is seen ... that things can be hidden.

We cannot share in that practice. We cannot simply absorb the light. We cannot hold grace within ourselves. Jesus' followers cannot simply absorb grace and leave it at that.

Through our advocacy and our ministry ... we reflect the light into the world and those hidden things are made known ... not because service or worship hold a personal benefit, but because such things bring the kingdom that much closer.

This morning, John ... the man sent by God ... points people toward the light that came into the world. He points them away from themselves toward some that truly offers hope for the world.

John calls on people not to be like that super-black material, but instead to free themselves from the darkness and carry hope into the world.

Instead of keeping ourselves at the centre, John pulls our gaze to others... to illuminate the way for others. We are

called to reflect God's love ... God's grace ... to the world.

To bear witness to this light ... to proclaim and live it with the power and humility of John the Baptist in the wilderness ... bending the light out to the world like a prism ... creating a rainbow of love that reminds the world of God's promise to people and to creation.

This morning, we heard of a God who put skin on the Word to empower others. All who receive Jesus and believe in him are enabled to put skin on the grace and love we know ... giving them substance for the world to witness and experience.

As we move toward the Epiphany and the period that lies before the Lenten Season, it seems an appropriate time to consider what words we can bring to life ... what words are we able to put skin on.

For some of us it is "justice" ... for others, it is "hospitality" ... for others it is "generosity" ... for still others it is "service" ... and there are other words.

Perhaps, we can consider how we can ... or how we do ... put flesh on these words. How do we make these words real for others ... because when we do the light of grace makes the ills of the world visible ... we reflect it ... bend it outwards to others so that the waves of love continue on to those whose lives become ones of desperation.

They then know that they are not alone ... that we are not alone ... that God remains ever-present ... ever-loving ... in their ... and our ... lives.
